Interesting Hobby Please enjoy the article submitted by Sharon and Jim Black. FAMILY HEIRLOOM ON WHEELS; JIM BLACK RESTORES CORVAIRS

Antiques usually span generations, but in the case of Corvair automobiles, it involves only a few years. For, you see, Corvairs are considered special interest cars, despite what Ralph Nader may think.

To the Jim Black Family, their handsomely restored 1964 Corvair Spyder convertible certainly fits the category of a special interest and is a source of justifiable pride. Jim, who is employed in the Industrial Engineering Dept., and his wife, Sharon, completely refinished the car into its present mint-like condition. Their restoration involved long hours of hard work, but now the shiny Daytona blue Corvair practically stops traffic wherever it goes.

Interest in the rear-engined Corvairs began for Jim in 1975 when he purchased a 1963 Corvair Monza coupe from Sharon's uncle for \$75 to use as a second car to drive to night school classes at Jefferson State Junior College. He still has this car in stripped down condition to begin another restoration.

While driving the 1963 Monza, he acquired a fondness for the way the car handled and performed and began talking with other Corvair collectors and members of the Vulcan Corvair Enthusiasts, a local Corvair club of 76 members. It was through this organization that Jim purchased the Spyder convertible during December, 1975 from a member living in Albertville.

The Spyder's engine had been disassembled in boxes so Jim towed the car back to Birmingham.

After the necessary machine work

on the engine, he reassembled it. He also rebuilt the carburetor and the turbocharger which required use of a dial indicator because of tolerances of ±.002". These precise measurements are required because of the 70,000 to 80,000 RPM operation of the turbocharger.

The brake system was also rebuilt to insure safe stops. If this sounds like a lot of back breaking work it was, but for the Blacks it also represented a labor of love. The inside of the Spyder is in the original condition except for new carpets.

Another big job that he and Sharon performed was stripping 80 percent of the original white paint off to the bare metal. After this work was completed and all chrome, lights, door handles, bumpers and interior were removed, Jim took the car to a professional automobile painter for restoration in the Daytona blue color. Restoring the paint on any classic car is a laborious task requiring workmanlike skill. The process involved removing the doors, hood and engine compartment, lid, completely priming these, and then applying ten coats

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of lacquer with extensive buffing. This consumed about a two months period.

When the car was returned from the painter, Jim and Sharon replaced all the parts which had been removed. In addition, a new convertible top was purchased which they also installed plus four factory wire-wheels that Jim states are quite rare.

The Spyder's top speed-though this is not an important requisite to Jimis about 120 mph, and it averages 19 miles per gallon of gas.

In addition to the Monza and Spyder, Jim owns two other Corvairs which were purchased as "spare parts cars." This was done since manufacture of the Corvair was discontinued in 1969 and some parts are unavailable from dealers. Parts from the two cars will be utilized to restore the '63 Monza or another Corvair and serve as a parts backup for the cherished Spyder.

The Vulcan Corvair Enthusiasts have held family outings at various sites around Alabama, such as Tannehill, Cheaha, Noccalula Falls, usually on Sundays. Regular monthly meetings are held on the third Friday evening of the month at the Homewood Public Library. The local group is a Chapter of CORSA, Corvair Society of America, and was host to a national mini-convention in 1973 when 300 Corvair owners gathered in the city during a Birmingham "mini-monsoon." Bad weather did not dampen the ardor of the Corvair collectors, however. "When Corvair owners get together for a show, they don't fool around; rain or shine, the show goes on," Jim said.

On February 11-13, the Corvair Club was represented by Sharon and Jim's Corvair at the "World of Wheels" car show held at the Birmingham-Jefferson Civic Center. Show chairman of the "World of Wheels" was Henry Sewell, Mono-Cast Dept., a member of the Birmingham Street Rod Association.

Jim and Sharon hope to attend the Central Florida Chapter Mini-Convention to be held in Orlando during April.

"Corvair restoration has been both a hobby and an investment, as the cars are appreciating heavily in value," Jim added. "I thoroughly enjoy it, and I'm not by myself; there are about 6,000 CORSA members in the country today."



Ford sold 869,001 F-series pickups while Chevrolet sold 636,150 Silverado's.




